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this treasury of quotes from deaf women about life love and overcoming multifaceted challenges provides a resource for those seeking inspiration and understanding compiled from contributions from women of all walks of life young and old single and married straight and lesbian soccer moms and single mothers women of color this collection recognizes the gender specific barriers that women confront daily and offers gender specific strengths for overcoming them also a beginning point of unity for deaf women everywhere these bits of wisdom address the need to pull together share the vision and resources needed for empowerment embrace diversity and contribute to life each day in small ways

using the premise that deaf people often are a minority within a minority 27 outstanding experts outline in this timely volume approaches to intervention with clients from specific diverse populations with an overview on being a psychotherapist with deaf clients this guide includes information on the diversity of consumer knowledge attitudes beliefs and experiences

this compelling collection advocates for an alternative view of deaf people s literacy one that emphasizes recent shifts in deaf cultural identity rather than a student s past educational context as determined by the dominant hearing society divided into two parts the book

opens with four chapters by leading scholars tom humphries claire ramsey susan burch and volume editor brenda jo brueggemann these scholars use diverse disciplines to reveal how schools where deaf children are taught are the product of ideologies about teaching about how deaf children learn and about the relationship of asl and english part two features works by elizabeth engen and trygg engen tane akamatsu and ester cole lillian buffalo tompkins sherman wilcox and bomee corwin and kathleen m wood the five chapters contributed by these noteworthy researchers offer various views on multicultural and bilingual literacy instruction for deaf students subjects range from a study of literacy in norway where norwegian sign language recently became the first language of instruction for deaf pupils to the difficulties faced by deaf immigrant and refugee children who confront institutional and cultural clashes other topics include the experiences of deaf adults who became bilingual in asl and english and the interaction of the pathological versus the cultural view of deafness the final study examines literacy among deaf college undergraduates as a way of determining how the current social institution of literacy translates for deaf adults and how literacy can be extended to deaf people beyond the age of 20

this book is a timely and thought provoking book and an important contribution to the expanding transdisciplinary field of deaf studies authors most of whom are deaf critically examine aspects of deaf culture reflect on diversity within the deaf community and advocate for the recognition of deaf people as a linguistic cultural minority grounded in critical pedagogy as its theoretical framework the book highlights the persistent oppressive forces faced by deaf people and also the challenges to these oppressive forces to promote social justice through acts of resistance and affirmation particularly expressed through the arts including music

what does it mean to be a deaf woman growing up in today s society are there obstacles hardship struggles those are only some of the battles that i ve had to endure growing up as a youngster teenager and young adult let me tell you i m from the city of brampton in ontario canada my household was nothing but calm my sense of safety was jeopardized at every turn as i write these words the physical mental and emotional pain still runs through the psyche of my being since i ve taken my first breath of life i believe i have a purpose in life first and foremost a wife and mother of my children i m so thankful that my children do not endure what i had to go through in the past with my own mom and dad i want to get my story out in this world it is a certain and difficult truth and terribly biased due to my family s upbringing and culture sometimes digging up old skeletons out of the closet and exposing them are the only way to release the pain and let go it is freeing not only from within myself but all around me perhaps this book would be a welcoming balm for others who have gone through similar horrible childhood as i have experienced no one should have to go through what i went through if you know of someone who is going through these types of experiences ask them to have professional help and get the state involved for one s protection and those of children

the author demonstrates that in 19th and 20th centuries and contrary to popular belief the deaf community defended its use of sign language as a distinctive form of communication thus forming a collective deaf consciousness identity and political organization
