this book explores the analytical and practical value of the notion of rooted cosmopolitanism for the field of cultural heritage many concepts of present day heritage discourses such as world heritage local heritage practices or indigenous heritage tend to elide the complex interplay between the local and the global entanglements that are investigated as glocalisation in globalisation studies however no human group ever creates more than a part of its heritage by itself this book explores an exciting new alternative in scholarly critical heritage discourse the notion of rooted cosmopolitanism a way of making manifestations of globalised phenomena comprehensible and relevant at local levels it develops a critical perspective on heritage and heritage practices bringing together a highly varied yet conceptually focused set of stimulating contributions by senior and emerging scholars working on the heritage of localities

in the summer of 1990 charles gainses and his wife bought 160 acres of wild land on the northeast coast of nova scotia they began to see the land as a home that might heal their recently battered thirty year marriage and as an opportunity to take on a big risky project instead of settling into the caution and gradual losses of middle class middle age enlisting their children they decide to build a cabin on the land with their own hands a family place is a transfiguring tale of personal and familial regeneration

drawing on recent international developments in criminal justice restorative approaches to conflict in schools highlights the long term ineffectiveness of punitive models of discipline in education contexts and examines an alternative approach underpinned by the principles of restorative justice this approach provides an opportunity for adults and young people to engage with a range of processes such as group conferencing and peer mediation whereby conflict and harm are confronted and repaired a future rather than past orientation is developed relationships are built upon the values and attitudes of respect inclusion and equality pupils learn inter personal and problem solving skills as well as social responsibility staff develop skills and confidence in working restoratively the risk of future repeat problems is minimised and a positive school ethos is developed these approaches have proven to be highly effective in criminal justice systems around the world and are beginning to be applied more widely in educational contexts this edited volume draws together for the first time contributions from an interdisciplinary field of international experts and practitioners on the subject and offers both critique and guidance in order that the implementation of restorative approaches in schools may be undertaken thoughtfully and sustainably this exciting new text will be a key reference book for locating contemporary international and inter disciplinary debate in the field

an extensive examination of hawaiian spiritual tradition and its emphasis on ancestral spirits by a descendant of an ancient lineage of hawaiian priests describes the time honored intergenerational bond between a people and a land that embodies the heart of indigenous spirituality a powerful and authentic portrait of a culture on the cusp of extinction in hawaiian spiritual tradition the sacred bond formed between the land and its people is perpetuated in every new generation by the voices of the ancestors who pass on this inheritance just as elders are the intermediaries between these voices and the younger generations the na aumakua or ancestral spirits are the intermediaries between the living and the sacred land they inhabit in the seven dawns of the aumakua moke kupihea takes the reader on his journey from childhood to young manhood as he experiences what remains of the spirit of his ancestors and learns the importance of remembering the descent of the aumakua and its spiritual link through the eyes sound voice touch people and breath constitute its seven dawns the means by which the author is reawakened to his native tradition the author s desire to know this tradition leads him as a young boy to seek out his kupuna his elders the old men of the mountains and learn from them the stories to be found in each feature of the landscape these men and the people he meets as he grows older became his kahu his ancestral guardians who teach him to

understand that the world of ancestral voices still speaks if only in a whisper learning how to hear these voices is the key for returning hawaii to its proud spiritual path and learning to live mindfully and soulfully with the land and with all who have come before us

climatic and environmental threats to cultural heritage examines the challenges that environmental change both sudden and long term poses to the preservation of cultural material acknowledging the diversity of human cultural heritage across collecting institutions heritage sites and communities the book highlights how in australia southeast asia and the pacific the quest to preserve such precious knowledge relies on records and narratives being available to inform decisions now and into the future bringing together a diverse range of stakeholders who have an interest in and responsibility for the care of cultural heritage material and places of cultural heritage value the book explores their thinking on and actions in relation to issues of climate change and environmental risk sloggett and scott highlight the stakeholders shared interest in drawing on their expertise to meet the challenges that environmental change brings to the future of our cultural heritage and our cultural identity based on the understanding that this global challenge requires local national and international co operation the book also considers how local knowledge can have international application climatic and environmental threats to cultural heritage will be of interest to those engaged in the study of heritage conservation archaeology archives anthropology climate change and the environment it will also be useful to practitioners and others attempting to understand the effect of environmental change on cultural heritage around the globe
